




This is their world now and we are proud to have tried to add something to their lives. This is their star to reach for a life of great fulfillment.

Principal's Message

Moat young people in the past have handled the requirements of life and its pressures adequately: we, the staff of the F. G. Miller High School, are confident that all of you will too.



VALEDICTORIAN

Today is our graduation, not only from high school, but also from adolescence. As we have progressed from youth to adulthood we have learned to adjust ourselves to the circumstances that growing up brings.

Being young today is not only to enjoy many advantages and comforts unknown to former generations but to endure many trials and to cope with many problems which did not confront our forefathers.

As a result, young people today have a consuming passion to make wheels turn, to go somewhere. Discontent with things as they are is not wrong in itself. It is the impetus which has ceated most of the greatness in men and women throghout history. Dissatisfaction with what is around us is not a bad thing if it prompts us to seek betterment; but the best sort of dissatisfaction in the long run is self-dissatisfaction which leads us to improve ourselves.

Every young person must prove that he is longer a child. The words "freedom" and "right", therefore, have a vivid meaning for us. To experience independence we must become awars of ourselves in depth and this requires conscious evaluation. The best and most that we can do is

put into practice what we understand.

We as grads ought to ask ourselves the question. "What are the thing that I ultimately value?" We must answer with the thought in mind, "I will have to live with myself all of my life, and what I decide now will influence my happines." We must ask ourselves then the question "Of what does a full life consist?" It requires that we stretch our mind muscles so as to grasp and understand much that will not force itself on us. It requires that we be awake and active. It requires that we see and appreciate beuty. It requires us to stand on our own two feet, measuring up life's demands, while at the same time we bow in awe before life's unexplained mysteries. We must recognize the dignity of duty, fairness, sympathy, co-operation, and all other things that make a decent society posible.

Obviously, then, there is more to making the most of our lives than learning the contents of our books. We must absorb the precepts into our own individual characters, fitted to our own environments and purposes in life. We must mature by accepting restraints so that restraints do not have to be imposed in life. We must do our best to think clearly so that we avoid embracing false doctrines, we must use deliberation so as to see through nonsense, we must realize our duty to tolerate worhtwhile opinions of others while maintaining our own principles. We must learn to discriminate between what the majority

approves of and what we believe is of value.

We cannot merely be by-standers doing nothing but criticize. As a Commissioner of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police put it: "He(the by-stander) is the Kibitzer on the game of life and I say to him, if you want to have any part in telling us the game should be run, put some chips in the middle of the table or shut-up." All that is expected of us is that we make the best use of the things that are within our power.

There is no easy way to make the most of our lives, but a satisfying life does not ask for comfort but for an opportunity to exerciseour abilities. Roosevelt summed up these principles in the doctrine of strenuous life; the life of toil and effort; of labor and strife; to preach that highest form of success which comes not to the man who desires mere easy peace but to the man who does not shrink from danger, from hardship, or from bitter toil, and who out of these wins the

splendid, ultimate triumph."

The future will be what we make it. It will be determined by our beliefs, our values, our attitudes. The foundation of these beliefs, values and attitudes has been laid through the concern and effort of our parents and teachers. If we build on that foundation we can look forward to tomorrow with assurance and anticipation, because we have lived full today





Athletics

During the 1969-70 school term, the athletes of the F. G. Miller High School successfully maintained the high standards of athletic ability set by former students. I find it amazed that our school is able to produce so many fine athletes year after year and I am sure that part of the credit goes to the many members of the staff who work hard to organize our sports activities and willing to volunteer to coach the teams. I think that we, as students of the F. G. Miller High School should feel very grateful that we have such an exceptional staff.

The County Volleyball tournament was was held in St. Paul on November 5. It proved to be rather disappointing as both the Senior boys, coached by Mr. Hellquist and the Senior girls, coached by Mr. Onusko, were defeated.

Basketball was again one of the major sports in our school. The Senior High Girls, coached by Mr. Boratynec, finished their league schedule with a perfect record of seven wins and no loses to win the county cup. The Senior Boys, coached by Mr. Sadlowske, rounded out their schedule with a impressive record of four wins and two loses. The county playoffs for zone representatives resulted in the Senbor boys squad advancing to the zone playoffs which the girls narrowly missed. The boys, however lost their first game by one point to a well balanced Vermilion team.

The Junior High teams were extremely active this year. Both the Junior High girls, coached by Mr. Richards, and the Junior High boys, coached by Mr. Onusko, won a consolation trophy in Elk Point first annual Junior High Invitational tournament. The Junior teams came up with a fine performance in the county tournament but unfortunately both teams lost two games straight.

As in past years we sent a Senior boy's and a Senior girl's Curling team to represent us in the Pepsi-Cola playoffs for a zone representative. The girl's team, who travelled to Grande Centre, came very close to winning as they won three games and lost only one. The boy's playoffs were held in Glendon. There our team won one and lost two.

Next came the County Badminton playoffs which were held in Elk Point. This year competitors from boys singles, girls singles, and mixed doubles, from our school, won berths in the zone playoffs held in Vegreville. Our representatives came up with impressive performances but were eventually beaten.

This year the **Co**unty Softball and Hardball tournament was held in Vilna. The Senior High girls, Coached by by Mr. Boratynec, repeated their domination the softball dividion. Both the Senior boys, coached by Mr. Taylor, and the Junior boys, coached by Mr. Onusko, won their first first two games but lost their final game. The Senior boy's Hardball team, coached by Mr. Stults, and the Junior girls, coached by Mr. Hellquist, lost their first games and were eliminated.

At this time I would like to express my thanks to the members of the teaching staff, as well as the many students for the co-operation I have received from them through out the year. This co-operation has made it a pleasure serving as Sports Director for the F. G. Miller High School's Students s Union.
