We have tried to design this yearbook in such a way that the memories of Junior and Senior High School come forth in the best ways possible.


Last year we introduced spot color to our yearbook, and again, we feel that it will add to the format, and help bring out school life as it was.






In looking at last year's yearbook, I had made mention of the new addition. Finally it is here for which we are very grateful. It is indeed something that we should all be proud of.


With the new wing now in operation, the character of our school will change. It is my sincere wish that we continue to grow and improve, and I am sure we will.




The Main Attraction.


Both teams were made up of a group of very active young people who worked well together. Unfortunately, both teams did not win any


trophies, but participated very well in the County Cup, and in their own tournament.


