SHORT STORY The Accident


It was not until the death of my grandfather, that I realized how unpredictable and frightening life really is. Before this first car accident that I was in, I hadn't experienced so much fear and anger. Hearing about an accident or a death never bothered me. Because I never thought this could involve my family or me.

The accident took place about thirteen miles south of home. It was a few hours after midnight and the driving slowly rocked me asleep. However, the road was a graveled sideroad and it was not very smooth. We used this particular road because the main highway was under construction. After picking up my grandparents from town we were homeward bound. Unfortunately, we never reached home that evening.

I was ten years old at the time, but I can remember everything as clearly as if it happened to me vesterday. A vehicle smashed into the side of our car. Our car was completely destroyed. Leaving the mass of iron sit on the bank in the shape of a V. Now that I am thinking of the crash it appears to me as being in slow motion. I remember waking up smiling because I presumed we were home. But instead of asking Mom if we were home, I asked if we were in the ditch. When she didn't answer my question, I opened my eyes. I found myself on the floor in the backseat. Lifting my hand to pull myself up I suddenly felt useless, and just sat there for a moment. It was in this moment that I heard my baby sister cry, my Mom comforting her, my grandparents moan, and my older sister complain about her nosebleed and her missing shoe. My head kept going around to try to figure out what had happened. Then I realized the situation. There was glass all over the seat, the windows were glassless, the door was pushed in, and the roof of the car came to a peak allowing the moonlight in through the hole. Tears started to trickle down my cheeks, but I didn't feel them. All I felt was a stinging sensation on my forehead. I rubbed my forehead and brought my hand back down filled with blood and glass. Seeing this blood made me instantly jump to my feet. When I stood up my eyes were glued to the front seat where my grandparents were. My grandma was holding grandpa on her lap. They, both, were absolutely soaked with blood. Instantly, I felt my stomach churn up and down. My sobs became louder and uncontrollable. Soon I was in hysterics. I needed to get out of that car. I quickly swung my feet over the front sea(and turned to climb out the door window my father clawed through, when suddenly an unfamiliar face glared in. I almost fell backwards, I was so surprised at the sight of him. In a slow, uncertain voice he asked if everyone was alright. At that moment I could have slapped him. I said, "Does it look like everything is alright?". After saying this I crawled out the same window, pushed his helping hand away, and kicked him. Running towards my father a hand grabbed my shoulder. I turned to see a lady, I distinctly saw her long, blonde hair. She knelt down and seized my shoulders. I was crying terribly hard. She started shaking me and telling me everything is going to be 0.K. This made me scream louder. Then I tried to tell her about all the blood I saw in the front seat. but she couldn't understand me. She pulled me against her breast and resisted my pulling back. It was then that I smelt beer on her breath. Viciously, I started hitting her head and pulling her long hair. She, finally, let go. When I reached Dad I told him about the blood in the car and the lady, but he just grabbed my hand and said nothing. Helplessly, I just stood there trembling, as my sobs were uncontrolable.

An oncoming vehicle took us all to the Myrnam hospital. Sitting in the back seat, all I remember hearing is grandpa asking Dad how us girls were. Eventhough, he was the one in the worst condition. We reached the hospital in a matter of minutes. There were nurses and policemen scrambling around like cattle. My mom sat me down in a chair and in a few minutes I found myself alone in the waiting room with that blonde lady and three other men. The lady had her hair in a bun and all four of them were staring at me. I hated them so bad because I was completely frozen with fear. They were smiling at me. And they made me feel like a balloon that would burst if I lifted a finger. I was terrified.


TALENTIS




The Lakeland Theatre Society's first performance this year was "The Valiant", and "The Ladies of the Mop" in dedication to the 75th Anniversary of Alberta.

To all of you, we thank you with all the love in our hearts. Today we have met an end. We achieved this end in part because of you. We now look forward to a bright new beginning.



I would like to close with a quotation by Robert Louis Stevenson: "To be what we are, and to become what we are capable of becoming, is the only end of life".


